Read the full 8.7 blog here **Unmasking Grooming: A message from Ikape James Ikape,** Media Coalition and Awareness to Halt Human Trafficking (MeCAHT), Member of the Commonwealth 8.7 Network Online sexual exploitation often involves explicit and provocative words, actions, and images designed to make the victim feel uncomfortable, stressed, or provoked. This form of abuse typically targets vulnerable individuals through a process known as grooming. Grooming often begins with the perpetrator repeatedly complimenting their victim, showing excessive kindness, and showering them with gifts. These actions are intended to make the victim feel safe and build a sense of trust and access. Once trust is established, the perpetrator may begin to demand intimate content from the victim, which they then use as blackmail material. Understanding these tactics is crucial in recognising and preventing online sexual exploitation. By being aware of the grooming process and its red flags, individuals can better protect themselves and seek help if they find themselves in such situations. It is crucial for victims to understand that they are not alone in their experience. Attempting to navigate this trauma alone can be overwhelming and isolating. It's much healthier to confide in trusted sources who can provide support and guidance. When faced with online sexual exploitation, it is essential to take the following steps: 1. Do Not Respond: Avoid engaging with the perpetrator in any way. 2. Cease Communication: Stop all forms of contact with the abuser. 3. Report the Abuse: Notify the relevant authorities and report the account. 4. Deactivate Accounts: Consider deactivating accounts used for communication with the abuser. Combating online sexual exploitation effectively requires a multifaceted approach. This includes: Legal Action: Strong laws must be in place and enforced rigorously. Personal Responsibility: Individuals should be cautious about sharing intimate content and private information online, whether with friends or strangers. Resource Allocation: Adequate resources must be available for the investigation of cybercrime incidents. Institutional Cooperation: All institutions involved in addressing sexual abuse cases must work together seamlessly. By combining legal measures, personal vigilance, and institutional support, we can make a significant impact in preventing and addressing online sexual abuse. 8.7 Members' News New projects and publications from our members ENGAGE NOW AFRICA Engage Now Africa educates students on modern slavery and human trafficking Engage Now Africa, Ghana Engage Now Africa organised educational forums for students, including a significant event at Abutia Senior High School in Ghana. The organisation also collaborated with local security agencies, which led to the rescue of 108 trafficking victims. International International Cocoa Initiative advocates for education and human rights due diligence in 2023 Annual Report International Cocoa Initiative, Ghana The organisation emphasised the importance of investing in the education of older children (15-17 years) to combat hazardous child labour, as highlighted in their 2023 Annual Report. Additionally, they announced a webinar aimed at helping retailers implement effective human rights due diligence (HRDD) to address child and forced labour. Devatop Centre organises walk against child domestic work Devatop Centre for Africa Development, Nigeria Devatop Centre For Africa Development organised a Walk Against Exploitative Child Domestic Work in Ijegun-Egba, Lagos State, as part of their "Protect Child Domestic Workers from Harm" project. Additionally, Devatop emphasised the need to create safe spaces for human trafficking victims to seek help and support. **CANDLE OF** Candle of Hope Foundation leads campaign against child trafficking Candle of Hope Foundation, Kenya The foundation promoted a campaign for World Day Against OUNDATI Trafficking in Persons, focusing on ending child trafficking. CoHF, in partnership with World Vision Kenya and IOM Kenya, distributed goats to vulnerable households in Marsabit County, a part of the Trafficking in Persons Project. My Choices Foundation aligns with UN SDGs and launches MY CHOICES Safe Village Programme My Choices Foundation, India My Choices Foundation emphasised their efforts to align with UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) like gender equality and reduced inequalities. They recently launched their Safe Village Programme to combat domestic violence and offer free counselling and legal services. On July 16, they reported the successful conviction of a police officer for exploiting a 14-year-old girl. They also highlighted new pledges from the King's Speech that support their mission and engaged their audience with a quiz on modern slavery. Sophie Hayes Foundation launches their 2024 manifesto Sophie Hayes Foundation, United Kingdom SOPHIE The organisation has recently launched a campaign demanding a future free from slavery and exploitation. The organisation urges policymakers to overhaul the current system, which often exploits vulnerabilities through online grooming, deliberate manipulation, and intersectional FOUNDATION marginalisation, leaving individuals susceptible to trafficking. The Foundation also calls on businesses to ensure their practices and supply chains are free from exploitation and to reject goods and products created through slavery and suffering. This landmark coalition unites a diverse range of stakeholders, including state agencies, civil society organisations, law enforcement, academics, researchers, and survivors, all working together to eradicate human trafficking and modern slavery in the Caribbean. The CCATIP's formation stems from a clear need for stronger collaboration. Stakeholders attending the Freedom from Slavery Caribbean Regional Forums in Trinidad and Tobago (February 2023) and Jamaica (May 2024) emphasised the necessity for cross-sector and cross-border partnerships. The study highlights gaps in policy, training, and data collection, emphasising the need for better protection and early intervention for children with SEND. MODERN SLAVERY | POLIFICATION | POLI Al shows promise in improving understanding of modern slavery survivors' support needs Modern Slavery & Human Rights - Policy & Evidence Centre This report from Project RESTART highlights the potential of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in understanding and addressing the support needs of modern slavery survivors. Funded by the Modern Slavery & Human Rights Policy & Evidence Centre, the study utilised AI to analyse case notes and revealed significant insights into survivors' legal, financial, social, and mental health needs. Labour and sex trafficking among homeless youth Loyola University This study examines labour and sexual exploitation among homeless youth in Covenant House's care across 10 cities. Researchers interviewed 641 homeless youth, revealing that nearly 19% were victims of human trafficking, with 14% trafficked for sex and 8% for labour. Factors such as economic desperation, housing NEW ORLEANS insecurity, and lack of job opportunities contribute significantly to their vulnerability. The study highlights the urgent need for targeted prevention, specialised interventions, and supportive legislative measures. Read the report <u>here</u>. Assessing the modern slavery impacts of the Nationality and **Borders Act: One year on** British Institute of International and Comparative Law (BIICL), Human Trafficking Foundation, Anti-Trafficking Monitoring Human Group Trafficking This report explores the effects of the Nationality and Borders Act Foundation 2022 on identifying and supporting modern slavery survivors in the UK. The Act introduces changes to defining potential victims, The **Anti Trafficking Monitoring** Group recovery entitlements, and disqualification grounds. UK labour market enforcement has been inefficient and fragmented, this briefing looks at how an effective SEB, in the form of the 'Fair Work Agency', could improve UK labour market oversight in order to build resilience against risks of labour exploitation.
